This year so far has carried an air of anticipation of things to come, receiving several shipments of Scriptures bound for dedications, preparing for major maintenance projects and a significant change of direction for the Campbell's.

One of these, in the *Kandas* language, is the product of a team led by Robyn Davies (pictured), as part of NITI (New Ireland Translation Institute) a multi-language cluster project. The dedication on April 28 is the culmination of over 12 years work. Though the process of drafting, checking, and reworking has been going on in the village all these years, many folk will see these Scriptures for the first time as they receive them that day. Their journey with God starts afresh.

It will be a time of joyful celebration, and we rejoice with those who rejoice.... even if our lowly contribution is simply processing the shipping!

Autim tok ...

On two Thursday evenings so far, Keith has had the opportunity to *autim tok* (speak publicly) to a group of 'boys' out at Lae City Mission (LCM) for their weekly Bible talks. The Mission provides training and a general redirection for young men who may otherwise end up 'on the wrong side of the tracks' so to speak.

The Australian LCM manager has invited some locals to lead the group through a broad biblical survey, as he discovered that virtually all of the boys had limited concepts of how the Old Testament related to the gospel and to believers today.

It was moving to hear over 100 male voices singing a local worship song with the following lyrics...

Mi no man-nating tasol, mi gat namba na strong insait long yu Jisas, Yu standet bilong mi.

Society would label them as *man-nating* – of no importance - yet in Jesus they have a Lord to follow from whom they draw strength and worth.

[tasol – only; namba – identity; standet – banner or flag]

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Answering the call...

An email received February 1 started us on a process that has taken several weeks to unfold. Keith was asked to consider a management role within the PNG Branch Finance Office, to commence mid-June. Though not surprising, it did catch us off guard as there was so much happening at our Lae Centre, and we had so many plans for the coming year.

The obvious response was to pray, consult some trusted friends, pray some more.... then continue to pray!

We appreciate greatly the prayers of supporters who we were able to share this need with, and can now confirm that we will be leaving our beloved Lae Centre and the staff team in September 2019 in order that Keith can take up this role in Ukarumpa, the main base for SIL (Summer Institute of Linguistics) here in PNG.





Ukarumpa is a community of around 600 people, both ex-patriate missionaries and PNG staff. It sits at the edge of the PNG highlands at an elevation of 1,500 metres. [For a bird's eye view of the community and the road down the mountain range <u>click here</u>]

We will be adjusting to life in a mission community as opposed to a major city; to chilly nights rather than sticky tropical evenings [*Praise God for open fireplaces! – Keith*]; and to a change in diet from tropical fruit to starchy vegetables. Thankfully we have many friends there already, but we will be leaving behind solid friendships in Lae, and local churches that we have built relationships with. The toughest part will be farewelling the Lae staff, but we are fully aware that it is God's work, not ours, and He will continue to work in their lives, just as He has a purpose in moving us on to another area of Kingdom service.

In the meantime, we will be focussing on finishing well in Lae, finalising some key projects, leaving as little as possible in the 'to do' pile, and equipping the staff to transition to a new management structure.

The road ahead...

At this stage, Elspeth has not committed to a set role in Ukarumpa, though there are, not surprisingly, plenty of vacant positions and other opportunities for her to apply her skills and experience.

Keith's Finance Office role will be one that utilises his management and accounting experience, and provides opportunities for training staff and developing standards. It can be a challenging role, as it deals with the finances of missionaries serving in PNG, and sustaining the operations of the branch in line with international requirements. Money is often a source of tension, and missionaries and mission organisations are not immune to that. Filling this role effectively will be of practical support to every individual serving with SIL in PNG. Of particular interest is the aspect of training and developing PNG staff, something that has been a focus for us here in Lae these past four years.
