After a division due to COVID, then a grandchild, then Christmas, we finally got around to spending time with some of our south-east Queensland church partners. In this, and other areas of life, we are learning to patiently wait on the Lord for His timing.

With our Townsville home in the midst of renovations, we took a break to head south again for a Campbell family gathering, and visits with several church communities. The main focus...

To close its biennial conference, SIL-PNG celebrated vernacular translation materials completed during 2020-2021. Despite the interruptions from lock downs and travel restrictions, the efforts of teams from 37 different language groups were blessed with God's word in their heart language...

- 4 full New Testaments dedicated
- 1 NT revised
- 8 Scripture portions published
- 13 audio Scripture portions distributed
- 4 oral Bibles translated
- 7 Jesus film videos dubbed



... and added blessings

Our vision statement in PNG is 'God's Word, in Every Language, in Every Life', and at the heart of the ministry is the desire to see Scripture impact people's lives. Through the lengthy process of translation, people engage deeply with the Lord of all the earth... their Lord.

Yamap translator... 'We are learning many things in our workshops. And we see that God is working in our lives through his work in our language. I used to not be concerned with God, but now I am following God in a much deeper way. When the trade language Bible is read in our services, children do not listen well. But when the Scriptures are read in our language, everyone listens carefully.'

Translation consultant... 'Once when I was doing a consultant check for a project, one of the men who was answering my questions asked me to stop the check. He asked me to pray for him because the portion of God's Word that we were checking was talking about him!'

To help people engage with Scripture, workshops bring village community members together to examine aspects of their life and traditional belief systems in the light of God's word. This format allows the powerful word to speak into their lives, transforming hearts and minds.

One of the students shared a great testimony of when some of the Patep men (including himself) were attacked by a neighbouring language group while they were out in the bush where they used to search for gold. He and other course participants tried to stop those who wanted to retaliate and fight back. When we asked what he would have done some years back (before the course), he said, 'I would have been the first to fight'. He started to weep when he reflected on what God has done in his life during the past few years through the understanding of the Scriptures. (It is unusual for PNG men to publicly cry).

Poked and prodded ...

Keith had his 2020 diverticulitis issue confirmed after seeing a specialist, with no significant issues as yet, and also learned that he has a sliding hiatus hernia. We'll spare you the digital images. For several years, this has given Keith occasional acid reflux, particularly when lying down to sleep. Thankfully, both issues can be primarily controlled with diet and natural remedies.

The other issue of joint pain is less clear cut, with x-rays, an MRI and blood test all showing no physical cause. The likely suspect appears to be an immune system over-reaction following a viral infection. At present, this also is proving manageable with basic supplements in the form of fish oil capsules.

We are thankful that these health concerns could be addressed in time, with some reassuring outcomes, and that they should not pose any hindrance for another term of service in PNG.

The path ahead...

What is a hindrance at present, is the delay in obtaining a PNG work permit for Keith. There is light at the end of the tunnel, with an Australian colleague obtaining theirs earlier this month, but we have no solid indication of when to expect a result. The reason for the unusual delay is not clear.

For now, we are making use of the additional time by packing up and selling our house, and serving the local churches. If we are ready to go, yet still waiting for paperwork, there are certainly temporary service options with Wycliffe Australia, or perhaps ministering to the rural churches we have visited who are without full-time pastors and in need of encouragement.

There has been an encouraging development in one matter which we have had people praying for... our required financial support, which had increased since our last term of service (see December and March newsletters). The initial increase created a pledged support shortfall of around \$1,600 per month — an issue which looked like requiring us to put more time into raising support. Wycliffe Australia had granted us approval to return to PNG on schedule, under the proviso that we return within 12 months to work on our partnership support requirement.

Praise God... generosity from partners has reduced this deficit to less than \$470 per month. We are continuing to pray that God will provide the additional support, and that finances will not be a factor in limiting the time spent serving in PNG during 2023.

Ministry


- Pray for the impact of God's word in PNG. It truly changes lives in so many ways. Specifically pray for the generation of children growing up with Scripture so readily accessible.
